

Seminary was not on my radar ten years ago. I did have a strong desire to delve more deeply into the Bible. Dr. Lewis visited our church in 2017 and introduced The Bible Seminary (TBS). When he explained the option to audit classes and recommended doing course work to convert to degree credits later, if desired, I was intrigued.

Within weeks I was auditing my first class—Pastor-Shepherd I with Dr. Rich Cozart—and I wanted more. The lectures and discussions were extremely formative, as were our readings. As I dove deeply into Job, Jeremiah, and Lamentations, Jeremiah impacted me significantly. Other readings brought about new and fresh encounters with God. I found Eugene Peterson's *Working the Angles: The Shape of Pastoral Integrity* so accessible that I wanted to read more and picked up his *Run with the Horses: The Quest for Life at Its Best*. Through these engagements, God whispered to me and revealed his call on my life.


As an older student and “at-home” mom, I was far removed from writing papers and making presentations. From the beginning, classes provided opportunities to intimately engage with the Bible and share with my professors and classmates what I learned.

Looking back, I can see how the class assignments were a necessary preparation for what God had planned. I also see a theme as I ventured forth with Dr. Lewis in Pastor-Leader I,

Prayer and Worship I, and Spiritual Formation and Ministry V; Dr. Petrovich in Bible Study Methods; Dr. Nyquist in Church History I, Theology I, Preaching and Teaching I; Dr. Savelle in Spiritual Formation I; Dr. Lokkesmoe in Theology II, III, and IV; Dr. Loken in Church History II; Dr. Glassman in Greek I and II, Hebrew I and II; and Dr. Steinmetz in Capstone Thesis. God refined me during my journey and drew me further into His purposes for my life. Along the way, I learned to give voice to community, relationships within the body of Christ, leadership, women's stories within the Old Testament, and contemporary issues facing the church. God was shaping me.

I recently completed my first year as a Doctor of Ministry student at Houston Christian University. I am focusing on female leaders in the Old Testament, particularly women who led during times of crises. I also use Zoom to lead two weekly discipleship groups. Two of my TBS friends share in this ministry, and their voices and knowledge add amazing depth to our conversations. It is a joy to continue to learn and grow weekly in the Word with them.

Looking back, I see God's hand working through TBS leading me to mature in faith, grow in knowledge, clearly hear my calling, enjoy amazing opportunities with gifted professors, and gain deep friendships within the body of Christ. I am truly blessed! ☩



A CALL TO STUDY

A Petroleum Engineer then stay-at-home mom, my life changed dramatically in 2012 when I enrolled in the first cohort of 12 graduate degree students at The Bible Seminary (TBS). I knew it was a decision of consequence, but was certain God called me and I trusted He would equip me. I walked by faith and not by sight as Dr. Lynn encouraged me when I faced difficulties and despair. The path was unfamiliar and challenging, plus I was studying in a new country, in a new academic system, and in a non-native language.

Over the next three years, I studied under incredible professors who taught the material and modeled humility, wisdom, and a passion for God's Word. One powerful impact was studying all 66 books of the Bible from Genesis to Revelation. I didn't just read Scripture—I wanted to understand it deeply, teach it faithfully, and live it boldly. Graduating with my Master of Divinity (MDiv) in 2015 was not just a personal achievement, it was a milestone in divine preparation.

BEGINNING AT HOME

My first assignment after seminary wasn't in a large church or overseas mission, but in the TBS classroom—my discipleship home. Over the next three years, I taught Bible Certificate classes in Spanish and invited friends and neighbors to join us. We studied Scripture together, asked questions, prayed, and grew as a community of faith. Our Spanish cohort toured Israel in 2018 with Dr. Lewis, Dr. Stripling, and others, and spent a week together with our families excavating on the archeological dig at Tel Shiloh, Israel (see photo below).



Then I had humble, intimate, powerful gatherings in our living room. I watched the Word of God change lives. I witnessed women grow in confidence, faith, and their desire to serve others. These small acts of obedience laid the foundation for a broader calling.

GLOBAL MISSIONS, LOCAL IMPACT

Eventually, I joined the Global Missions Department at Grace Fellowship Church where I continue to volunteer. We use Discovery Bible Study (DBS) which is designed to empower believers to tell a Bible story, read, understand, ask questions, and apply God's Word without needing formal teaching. It emphasizes obedience and multiplication: discovering truth in Scripture and immediately sharing it with others. This approach resonated deeply with me. With seminary training and experience with ministry in small home settings, I have experienced the power of making disciples who make disciples.

I began facilitating DBS groups, first with local family and friends and then through connections in Colombia and Peru. The model spread naturally as people experienced transformation through the Word. Before long, I was leading online groups in India, France, Venezuela, and the Dominican Republic. Language and distance were no longer barriers—only opportunities for God's Word to reach further.

I've seen teenagers, mothers, and new believers alike grow by engaging Scripture consistently and obediently. I desire to lead by example and empower others to hear from God and act on what they learn. That is the heart of discipleship.

The Journey

FAMILY MINISTRY FIRST

MISSION AND MULTIPLICATION

Prior to teaching others, I practiced with my own family. Together, we read and discussed Scripture, which helped deepen our relationships and give us a spiritual framework to process life's challenges. We similarly engaged with extended family in Colombia and Peru, turning regular conversations into faith-filled encounters.

My sons have seen me teach, train, and learn. They've heard the testimonies of people around the world touched by God's Word. I pray this legacy continues through them and beyond. My husband accepted Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior this Mother's Day 2025. God is faithful, glory and honor to Him!



Looking back, I'm profoundly grateful for the equipping, training, teaching, and opportunities TBS offered. I gained knowledge, confidence and clarity in my calling, and built a foundation strong enough to support personal growth and others around me. Seminary gave me tools; God gave me vision. Through prayer, community, and a commitment to Scripture, that vision is becoming reality.

I continue to train and facilitate Discovery Bible Studies and do Trauma Healing with individuals and groups in multiple countries. I mentor others to become facilitators so the work can multiply far beyond me. God continues to transform me not just through learning the Bible, but by living it and sharing it. From quiet moments around our dining table to video calls with believers across the globe (see photo below), I see the same truth playing out: God's Word is alive, powerful, and life changing. I'm not expecting and don't need all the answers; I need to be available, faithful, and obedient.



I've learned that I don't have to wait for perfect conditions to start making disciples. We can start where we are—with family, friends, church, or online community. Open the Bible and study together. Ask simple questions. Obey what you learn. Share with others. That's how the Kingdom grows.

I once sat in TBS classrooms with trembling hands, a heart full of hope, and trust in an unknown future. I rejoice in my journey and continue to learn, teach, disciple, and by God's grace, multiply. ☺

From Pastor to Archaeologist

In “Peabody’s Improbable History” segments originally introduced in the classic cartoon series *The Adventures of Rocky and Bullwinkle and Friends* (1959-64, Jay Ward Productions), genius bowtie-wearing beagle Mr. Peabody and a young boy, Sherman, traveled through time in a “Wayback Machine.” Series episodes included Mr. Peabody telling his pet boy, “Sherman, set the Wayback Machine to (a specific year).”

A trip in the Wayback Machine to 2017 would show the start of some unbelievable changes in my life. Although I engaged in studies of archaeology on my own, I never imagined becoming an archaeologist. At the time, my career journey included working in computer hardware and software technology for Wells Fargo, then Community Healthcare, while pastoring a small church in Wake Village, Texas, just outside of Texarkana, Texas on the Texas and Arkansas border. I entertained no aspirations of advanced degrees or serious archaeology, until a single event shifted my path.

When Dr. Scott Stripling, TBS Provost and well-known archaeologist, spoke at my church, his presentation changed how I think about and present the Gospel. Over the next seven years, I engaged in graduate studies with The Bible Seminary (TBS) and excavation field experiences at Tel Shiloh, Israel. In 2024, I officially became an archaeologist upon receipt of my Master of Arts in Biblical History and Archaeology (MABHA) degree.

TBS staff and faculty have become friends and counselors in my spiritual growth. I enjoy studies that focus on a particular subject and content and one or more books in the Bible. I find it refreshing that professors want students to learn course content and apply it in life, not just focus on rote memorization and study for tests.

My TBS experiences directly and positively affect my teaching, which my congregation greatly appreciates. Preparation is both easier because I can relate more first-hand experiences from the

land of the Bible, and more challenging because exegesis takes more time since professors challenge me to study deeper and seek broader understanding.

For example, during my studies on exegesis and the book of Genesis, I felt like I previously understood nothing in Genesis. While not much changed in my personal theology, I continuously found an immeasurable wealth of teachable truths, particularly compared to other Ancient Near Eastern parallels.

I'm struck by how God uses unexpected moments to redirect our paths. TBS and the Shiloh dig didn't just equip me with knowledge, they deepened my love for the Bible and its truly remarkable relevance to everyday life. My sermons are enriched by historical context and archaeological insights that help make the Gospel not just a story but a living reality. I no longer just teach ethics or morals, but invite people to walk Bible lands together and see the Bible's truths unfold in vibrant, tangible ways.

In conversations with Dr. Stripling, I decided to continue studying at TBS even after attaining my degree, especially since asynchronous learning can fit into my busy schedule. After all, lifelong learning isn't about collecting degrees, but embracing a lifestyle of curiosity and growth. As long as I can keep learning while pastoring and working, I plan to continue exploring new depths in Scripture and archaeology with my friends and mentors.


Join Us!

TWO SPIRITUAL LESSONS




In *Boss Like God: A Blueprint for Elite Workplace Performance* coauthored by TBS President Dr. K. Lynn Lewis, section four addresses biblical strategies for “leaving well.” Technically, he reviews three biblical examples of transitions from one leader to another, but the overarching point is the concept of outgoing leaders finishing well, something that is much easier said than done.

While writing my own book, *The Trinity in Eden* (2024 Nehemiah Press), I found it difficult to finish well. My research involved overwhelming amounts of information. My journey included finding data, analyzing it, attempting to coherently synthesize it, and then organizing and presenting it for constructive criticism—after which the process would begin anew. The work took Herculean effort. I seriously

considered (and relatives advised) stopping, simply not completing the task. After all, I had already graduated and the end goal seemed insurmountable. Despite my personal misgivings, St. Paul’s message to Archippus echoed in my mind, “See to the ministry which you have received in the Lord, so that you may fulfill it” (Colossians 4:17).


The decision to finish well has affected me in other ways. Sometimes in life—whether at work or among family—stressful, inefficient, or even laughable tasks are required of us. But, I regularly find it best to attempt to finish well what one has started.



In courses with Dr. Israel Steinmetz, he suggested that Americans live in a scientific world that fundamentally merits measurable methods, outcomes, and results. None of these are bad, but faith does not work that way. Some things of God cannot be measured. It took much faith and patience to work through the process of publishing my manuscript, including navigating my own reservations and the weighty drains of time and energy. Furthermore, I hoped to prove useful to the Church after graduation, yet my contributions appear small. As I see it, as occasions present, I teach Sunday school, lead prayers, assist with communion, visit the elderly, and study Scripture. And due to memory challenges, I wonder how helpful my lessons have been.

Yet, maybe that which I do not see bears more significance. I recall Elisha’s prayer for his servant, “Lord, please, open his eyes so that he may see” (II Kings 6:17). When the servant’s eyes were opened, he saw the mountains surrounding them full of horses and chariots of fire. For now, I continue to live in Springtown, Texas and work as a Latin teacher. In education as a career since 2014, I have come to question many practices of modern American education. Since the system evidences a steady decline since the 1960s, and good jobs are available elsewhere, I sometimes consider leaving something for which I appear to be made. Although I did not set out to become a teacher, once offered the opportunity, I fell in love with it. So, I am learning that perhaps I should not underestimate my contributions to a kingdom which does not always come with signs easily observed, but simply trust God and live in daily obedience.




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PROCLAMING THE SON IN THE LAND OF THE RISING SUN

We joined Japan Mission as full-time missionaries in January 2024 after a multi-year journey of following the Lord's call. While I (Ed) attended TBS from 2014-19 and graduated with my Master of Divinity degree in 2019, I (Toby) audited several classes and TBS had a major impact on our lives!

It was during our time at TBS that we began to hear the Lord's guidance toward full-time missionary work. A TBS professor challenged us to reflect upon the specific ways in which the Lord orchestrated the events of our lives and then consider where that life experience intersected with the need for the Gospel—specifically amongst an unreached people group.

At the time, I (Ed) had a long-standing connection to the land of Japan as part of

my secular employment in medical devices. As we prayed, we sensed that the Holy Spirit was leading us to Japan. We didn't realize it then but Japan is home to the 2nd largest unreached people group in the world. With a population of around 126 million, far less than 1% know Jesus. Japan is also located within the 10/40 window and dominated by Buddhism and Shintoism.

Starting in 2019, we traveled to Japan intermittently for both work and ministry exploration and connected with numerous missionaries and mission agencies. However, the COVID pandemic halted our momentum, but not the Lord's work. While we remained in Texas, the Lord sorted, shifted and shored up His vision, plan and preordained path that He had prepared in advance for us to walk in. In January

2023, we traveled across Japan visiting 17 different mission agencies and churches and meeting over 60 people in a little over 3 weeks! We were truly blessed to see the many ways in which God was working. Although the percentage of Christians is very small, we heard absolutely amazing multi-generational testimonies.

During that trip we clearly felt the Lord guiding us to apply for service with Japan Mission. Their motto is "Called to Serve" and we've found that their ministry goals align well with our call. Japan Mission seeks to save the lost souls of Japan and to support local Bible-believing Japanese churches and pastors. Japan has abundant material blessings and is quite economically and socially advanced. However, societal and workplace pressures

can absolutely crush the soul as indicated by high rates of loneliness, depression and suicide. Japan also experiences high rates of natural disasters, especially earthquakes and tsunamis. Japan Mission believes that small, Bible-believing Japanese churches can serve as beacons of hope in each community.

So, rather than plant new churches, Japan Mission focuses on supporting existing Japanese churches. By serving in local communities, we are able to connect Gospel seekers to groups of believers in their location. We offer English classes for adults and kids (both at local churches and on-site at Japan Mission), a kid's kinder program, weekend café, and a newly created mini-homestay program. These all fall under Japan Mission's CAYA ("Come As You Are") ministries. We teach English in our home to junior high school boys and have begun to develop deeper relationships with their extended families, especially during our once a month dinners in our home with the boys and their families.

English immersion programs are very popular with the Japanese, and many spend a small fortune to travel overseas to

live with an English-speaking family for a time. The Lord has opened a door for us to serve as a local "mini-homestay" program right here in Ikoma, Japan! We host people in our home and give them a taste of Texas without ever leaving Japan. We cook and enjoy meals together, play games, watch English shows, and share our respective cultures. Over several days, we invite homestayers to share our daily Christian walk with the Lord. They are invited to observe our daily quiet time, prayers before meals, discussions of Christian-themed paintings or Bible verses in our home, and visit a local church together on Sunday. As one can imagine, this often organically leads to deep, engaging conversations.

We have hosted homestayers from ages 5-55 (so far) and received interest from two large companies and a local school. The companies plan to offer our homestay program as a company benefit to their entire employee base! Please pray that the Lord would continue to bring lost souls from Japan to our doorstep and across our threshold, and that homestayers would leave changed and deeply curious about their experiences under our roof permeated by the peace of Christ. Ripple Effects

One of my favorite poems is “The Road Not Taken” (Robert Frost, *The Atlantic Monthly*, Aug 1915), especially these lines at the end:

*I shall be telling this with a sigh
Somewhere ages and ages hence:
Two roads diverged in a wood, and I,
I took the one less traveled by,
And that has made all the difference.*

As a teenager, I was drawn to the mystery of the road less traveled. It sparked my curiosity and sense of adventure. The allure held me captive. What might lie around the next bend? What uncharted experiences await my next step?

Since then, I have excitedly discovered diverse paths and pioneered new things. As my faith has deepened, I have found my lesser lane a place where I am keenly aware of my desperate need

for God and that He is faithful.

In late 2018, I arrived with a fervor at two diverging roads. After countless pursuits to discover a deep, satisfactory Bible study, a friend suggested I consider seminary. I attended a preview day at Dallas Theological Seminary that awakened an excitement, an anticipation to swim in deep waters of theology, hermeneutics, church history, and practical ministry training.

At the same time, I received a flyer from The Bible Seminary (TBS) that caught my attention with these words, “Looking for a Sign?” Indeed, I had, so I decided to test seminary out and audit one class—Greek. Despite not knowing anything about the language, the engagement of the students captivated me. I also found the professors intentional and responsive and the staff amazingly accessible. It felt like family, and a place to grow, be sharpened, and challenged. So, in January 2019, I chose the road less traveled and forged ahead. I had no clue how much that decision would impact life.

In 2020, I dove headlong into Ananias House, a ministry helping

equip local churches throughout the Middle East and North Africa (MENA). I led a women's leadership program focused on training a group of women for five years, twice a year, in discipleship, leadership, and trauma healing.

I was also studying "BSM 501: Bible Study Methods," learning the value of understanding context within Scripture and engaging in observation, interpretation, and application. I applied this in the mission field as we recorded videos with translators, uploaded them for each of the 40 women to view in their own language, and gave the women homework to follow through with practical applications. I saw an immediate ripple effect of my classroom studies as women throughout the 10/40 window benefited in real time from what I was learning in my TBS classroom.

One woman, married to a pastor, shared how her husband observed her and decided to use what she was learning to help him prepare his sermons. Suddenly, men and women within this persecuted church were engaging with God's Word intentionally and with less convoluting influence from their culture.

We also saw this ripple effect in my local church as I joined a curriculum writing team. As we implemented principles from my Bible Study Methods, Bible Panorama, and theology courses, we began to unpack Scripture in ways more purposeful and hermeneutically sound. Immediately applying these core teachings created countless opportunities for feedback, questions, and strengthening ministry deliverables.

While taking "Pastor-Leader: Preaching and Teaching" courses, I served on a teaching team at Grace Fellowship women's Bible study and moved into the role of Teaching Director. As I learned preparation processes from different pastors throughout the West Houston/

Katy area in class, I began to see patterns of intentionality, prayer, and, ultimately, heaviness. The weight of delivering God's Word, and how messages were exegetically constructed became a central focus for me as I both taught and began leading our team. I wanted us to understand context, authorial intent, and carry the weight of delivering God's Word while also remaining humble. I became acquainted with Kelly Needham's Teach-Equip program through our class. As our church adopted it, she has mentored us in addressing the heart, processes, and outcomes of teaching.

One of the most profound ripple effects occurred in the women's program at Ananias House. In trauma healing, a team of licensed and lay-counselors help

women experience group and individual counseling using narrative exposure therapy. Most have experienced some level of persecution through war, terrorism, corrupt governments, famine, and extreme poverty. This healing focus is critical to discipleship, strengthening their faith journeys, and building their churches. My "Pastor-Shepherd" courses—focused on biblical counseling and the significance of Scripture in healing—helped shift how we conducted these sessions.

Our Ananias House training rhythms already included small group components for dialoguing about lectures and

practical applications. As we considered ways to help shift Islamic cultural mindsets, we knew Scripture was critical. So, we made it a pivotal focus to paint pictures with Scripture to help enable women to see not only what is possible, but also to discern God's call in their own lives. We've watched as many have made life changes deeply rooted in the Word of God—a far more sustaining anchor for these women than just words from a group of Americans.

I continue to see astounding ripple effects from my decision to take the road less traveled. TBS trained me academically and experientially, through classes and relationships, and with a balanced focus on graduation and forging a family that supports and challenges me in life and ministry. TBS has its fingerprints all over my family, the ministries I serve, my church in Katy, Texas and on the global Church around the world. In my own journey in uncharted territories at home and abroad, I deeply feel the need to continually seek the Lord, press in, and hold tight knowing that our Father will never fail. And that has made all the difference. ☺

YESTERDAY IS GONE DEEPER WE GO

After completing my TBS Bible Certificate in 2019, I still had a lot of questions. Three professors encouraged me to enroll in the graduate program, but I had no intention of doing that and came up with every excuse for not applying. When I took my questions to God, I heard the same message, "Enroll in the master's program." So, after talking with Dr. Scott Stripling, I enrolled in the TBS Master of Arts in Biblical Languages and Culture (MABL) program in 2019, and the rest is history.

My experiences at TBS taught me so much about studying the Bible, especially in-depth study. I also learned how to apply what I had learned. II Timothy 2:15, "Be diligent to present yourself approved to God, a worker who does not need to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth," became much clearer to me.

Since graduation, I have continued my YouTube channel, "BSM How I Study and Understand my Bible" (Youtube.com/@myBiblestudy). A book-by-book, verse-by-verse Bible study, God has blessed me with increasing numbers of subscribers. I also post my videos and a daily devotional on Facebook. All glory to God, I am amazed how many people watch and share them. People at family functions, and through private messaging write comments, thank me with feedback like, "I needed that word, thank you for your teaching, I now

understand what that Scripture means." I am grateful that the Lord uses me to bless others and spread His Word.

I attend a community Bible Study and assist the teacher in answering questions or clarifying Scripture. After teaching the book of Revelation, ladies told me I was an answer to prayer since they had not attempted to read it out of fear. Due to my teaching, they no longer feared reading and studying it. I thank TBS for the excellent preparation to teach and share the word of God.

Personally, God has blessed our family with two of our three children marrying in the past two years and we are about to become first-time grandparents! I continue

to serve on the Prayer Team at Lakewood Church in Houston, Texas, where I keep our team informed, remind them to pray Scripture, and provide team Scriptures for healing, jobs, relationships, and climbing tough mountains. I occasionally speak at leader meetings and share information gleaned from TBS classes, particularly

the PAS 511: Pastor-Leader I course.

They truly have a heart for God and His Word, and love walking with others in their journeys of education, faith, and ministry service.



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WHAT REALLY MATTERS

Our reverse exodus from Israel through Egypt during war

A crisis often strips everything down to what really matters. I didn't expect the hardest days of our 2025 archaeological excavation in Israel to turn into one of the most beautiful displays of unity I've ever witnessed, but it did. It started Friday, June 13—the last scheduled day of our seventh annual four-week dig at Tel Shiloh—when our team faced a situation we never imagined.

Unbeknownst to most, Israel's cabinet approved Operation Rising Lion the prior day. Intended to curb Iran's increasing nuclear capabilities and decades of terrorist activities and military actions aimed at eliminating Israel, the mission's name was derived from Balaam's first oracle, "It will now be said of Jacob and of Israel, 'See what God has done!' The people rise like a lioness; they rouse themselves like a lion" (Numbers 23:23–24 NIV).

American President Donald Trump had earlier given Israel and Iran 60 days to negotiate a deal. On that Friday—the 61st day, and coincidentally an hour before our normal 4 AM wake-up time on dig days—we received a State of Emergency phone notification from the Israeli government with instructions to be ready to enter a local, secure shelter if notified to do so.

The warning was not entirely unusual. Iran, Hamas, Hezbollah, and the Houthis have been attacking Israel for a long time. In just the 21 months since October 7, 2023, approximately 30,000 drones and missiles have been shot at Israel from Gaza, Iran, Lebanon, Syria, and Yemen. Warnings and sirens are a regular part of the ebb and flow of living there.

Granted, due to Israel's excellent defensive and security systems, most munitions don't reach their targets. Also, our team had not previously been in Israel during most of the large barrages; most years one or two missiles are shot and shot down every few days during the six weeks we are touring and excavating. However, this year, one week prior to the start of the tour before the dig, a Houthi missile from Yemen slipped through Israel's Iron Dome defense system and struck near Ben Gurion Airport in Tel Aviv on May 4. This caused many airlines to cancel flights and many of our 135 dig team members from around the world had to scramble to find creative reroutes with the few airlines still offering flights just to get to Israel in the first place.

So, despite the wishes of our Ambassador Hotel manager, we boarded our bus in

Jerusalem at 4:59 AM as usual, passed with the appropriate approvals and permissions unrestricted through our normal checkpoint into the West Bank (Judea and Samaria), and arrived at Shiloh around 5:40 AM in time for sunrise, just like every other weekday morning over the previous four weeks. We felt like Shiloh was the safest place for us. It was quiet—quieter than usual. But the mood of the dig that day was different. Somber. Down.


We soon found out that Israel targeted key Iranian military command centers, installations, leaders, and nuclear facilities with cyberattacks and airstrikes on 100 targets in six cities. We were also told that about 100 Iranian drones were shot down near the borders of Jordan and Israel. At that moment, the immediate threat seemed no longer a concern. Yet, it felt like the whole world was holding its breath. *Was that it? Was the operation so successful that I would get to go home tomorrow as planned?*

Back at the hotel, around 7 PM, we heard the first sirens. Although they were the same sirens we heard in previous days warning of incoming Houthi missiles, these warnings meant something entirely different. While some stood outside to

look, locals disappeared and staff urged us to come inside and enter the shelter. After ten minutes we were free to leave the shelter but urged to stay close by. This became our new routine for days. Sirens would go off, many would run to the windows to glimpse the Iron Dome at work intercepting missiles while some entered the shelter.

As Iran continued to respond by firing around 100 ballistic missiles over the next 24 hours, we watched in awe as Israeli people of all different cultural and religious backgrounds—Jews and Arabs and Christians, Israelis and Palestinians and foreign nationals—faced attacks over their homes. However, even as many of us were packing to fly out the next morning, all flights to and from Israel for the foreseeable future were cancelled. Suddenly, we found ourselves stuck with them in the middle of a full-fledged war.

Around 3 AM on one of those never-ending days of intermittent sleep and emergency alerts, an explosion woke me. Over time, I realized I was experiencing anxiety. Two years prior, a small group of our Shiloh team happened upon the site of an attack on Jewish residents in the village of Eli, a few miles north of Shiloh.

Two Hamas terrorists shot seven people and killed four right before we drove past the roadside store where it happened. Although we didn't see the attacks, an armed Jewish civilian shot and killed one of the terrorists within sight of our vehicle as we approached. In my mind, I can still see his body lying on the ground.

I had noticed that helicopters or low-toned booms seem to startle me more easily. This year, as I began to realize I was experiencing post-traumatic stress, I found myself praying in deep earnest. *Lord, why would you send me to Israel to die, to get blown up?* I begged Him to

show up long enough for me to leave. I was angry at Israel for attacking Iran just 24 hours before I was scheduled to fly home. But the Lord convicted me. *Is your comfort worth more than the lives of Israeli and Palestinian people?* I felt ashamed of my self-centeredness, as well as my fear. *Why can't I trust you more Lord? Can't I have enough faith to endure things like this without fear? Why can't I see you moving?*

But then, my eyes were opened, and I began to see God move. It wasn't through a large miraculous gesture, but through people, and it was life changing. Because of all the canceled flights, the costs of

escaping suddenly increased significantly. The Associates for Biblical Research (ABR) wasted no time trying to help cover the extra expenses. A GoFundMe they posted on Facebook with a \$25,000 matching gift raised over \$50,000 within a day or two. People who have never met me were donating their hard-earned money to help me get home.

Most of our groups managed to exit through Israel's southern border to Egypt, cross the Sinai Peninsula and travel through the tunnel under the Suez Canal to reach the Cairo International Airport. Since Egypt is extremely strict about

antiquities, pottery sherds or purchased antiquities are often seized and people can get arrested. As travel plans materialized, many of us scrambled to find a solution to get antiquities and souvenirs home. Zak, a Palestinian Christian, is a trusted shop owner in the old city of Jerusalem who takes care of us whenever we are in the country, so I sent him a message to see if I could pay him to ship mine home.

He arrived at the hotel within 40 minutes to help me and anyone else who needed items shipped. When we tried to pay him, he refused. I realized at that moment that God was working the whole time to take care of me and so many others. I encountered His loving care through strangers and friends, and I wasn't the only one.

"When I got home," team member and friend, Suzanne Lattimer, told me, "two of my coworkers wanted to know the list of

meds I was taking that made me so calm considering everything I had just endured. I told them it wasn't WHAT I was taking, but WHO I knew—Jesus! There was such a calm about people that seemed totally unnatural to the situation. Like, not the kind of calm you can fake or force. Not just peace from the storm, but peace in the storm. Because when you know the One who commands the wind and waves, you don't have to panic when everything around you is shaking."

"It was amazing to see the power of prayer in action from so many back home," Jeff Smith says. "We felt tremendous peace throughout, and the trip went smoother than anyone expected. God is so good!"

One of my fellow students, Nathan Burris, who lives and works as a missionary in Indonesia, wrote, "Digging with friends from all over the world, we have this immediate connection knowing

why we are here. I feel at home in this community with my brothers and sisters in Christ. This must be a taste of what heaven will be like!"

Dr. Haskel Greenfield says, "Israelis are the bravest people I have ever known. They make sure that most people can continue to go about their daily lives even when being attacked by their enemies."

Thanks to our hotel manager, Issa Dahdal, and NetTours, ABR's tour operator, 3 groups including more than 60 of our team members were able to get out safely through Egypt. The 27 people in my exodus group traveled a collective 46,140 miles through 11 countries to return to our respective homes. God got us all there safe, and now we are all safely home. God is good, and our eyes are opened to what really matters in all of life, and not just in the middle of a crisis. ☺

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ADVENTURES IN EDUCATION

As The Bible Seminary (TBS) celebrates its 15th anniversary, I've only experienced it for one fifth of that time. However, based on my experiences with other Bible colleges and seminaries, TBS is distinctly different. More than education, TBS offers a thrilling adventure of unique relationships, mentorships, and hands-on training.

Most of my post-high school education involved classroom lectures. We often lived

within walking or driving distance and attended classes on site. While earning my B.A. in Biblical Studies, I regularly drove 45 minutes from work to attend evening classes. One required course in another location involved a three-hour drive each way.

I later earned a Master's in Biblical Counseling entirely via remote education. My instructors and I initially mailed (then later emailed) all the instructions, coursework, grading, and comments. I rarely had any

in real time. Asynchronous students watch videos of recorded classes and are required to summarize what they learn from lectures and class discussions and interact with professors. Courses also utilize social media to enhance interactions between students. The new student information system (Populi) enables exceptional communication. All of these communication tools work together to help all participants, when they do eventually meet in person, feel like they already know each other. I experienced this at the 2023 Near East Archaeological Society meeting the first time I met some classmates and professors in person; we experienced an instantaneous bond.

Peer mentoring occurs in-person and online, too. We interact with questions about assignments, recommend resources, and otherwise assist each other rather than expect professors to hold our hands through everything. In this way, we learn both data and skills.

I have particularly enjoyed TBS's hands-on, practical approach to education. I first became aware of TBS through the Associates for Biblical Research (ABR) excavation at Tel Shiloh where I spent two weeks excavating. The opportunity to continue learning at a higher level along with hands-on experience appealed to me. I started off slowly, taking just one class, which was exceptional due to the very knowledgeable professor. That class was completely online since the professor lived in Florida and students attended online from around the world. I then attended a seminar in-person offered by the TBS Provost in my area, and that experience reminded me of how much I prefer in-person classes even though I appreciate the convenience of online. Although I live in California, I have attended classes all three ways: 1) in-person at the home campus in Katy, Texas and on-location throughout Israel; 2) synchronously online even when I'm at work, serving, or volunteering in my community; and 3) asynchronously online when necessary.

personal interactions with professors. I did travel to the institute for my ThD cohort introductory meeting, but afterwards never saw or directly interacted with any other students in the program.

However, when TBS started experimenting with various distance learning systems in 2017, direct, regular interactions between professors and students remained a priority. By the time Covid hit during the 2020 semester spring break, TBS had already integrated Zoom platform technology and rolled into offering high quality Distance Education without missing a beat. Even as TBS returned to in-person classes—first outdoors, then spaced out indoors, and then back to regular seating—TBS continued to offer all courses live, live online (synchronous), and recorded online (asynchronous). Again, direct interaction between all course participants—no matter the mode of learning—remains a high priority.

Synchronous students can see and interact with professors and other students

TBS encourages students to attend and even present papers at events like Evangelical Theological Society (ETS) Annual Meeting and Near East Archaeological Society (NEAS) meeting. These opportunities allow students to meet and interact with experts and professionals and also develop stronger bonds with classmates and professors.

What TBS offers on-location in Israel really sets the seminary apart. Our Tel Shiloh excavation teams are continuously one of the largest excavations in the Middle East. Touring with archaeological, historical, and theological experts takes TBS learning experiences to an entirely different level far beyond what most people experience during Holy Land tours. I have worked on the dig and toured Israel with very famous people and world-renowned experts. I am learning archaeology by doing archaeology alongside people who know what they are doing. I've also begun to help newcomers learn under my leadership. Together, we've dug and scoured through tons of debris with some memorable highlights like that time I was the first person in 3,500 years to hold a flint knife blade.

This year, most of our excavation team members experienced quite an adventure due to airplane reschedules when a Houthi missile hit near the Ben Gurion airport in Tel Aviv. Those of us still in Israel on Friday of Excavation Week 4—when Israel launched Operation Rising Lion against Iran—embarked on quite an adventure finding alternate routes home. Authorities shut down our excavation early as we watched missile interceptions overhead. I was with one of 3 groups that traveled almost 20 hours to Cairo to get flights back to the U.S.

From the beginning, I came to TBS for more than a degree—I came to be discipled. Born and raised in North Carolina, I had a front-row seat to both the beauty and brokenness of the local church. I saw people healed and hurt, rise with power and fall from pride. I promised God I would be different, and found out that required being deeply rooted in Him. From my first class, I've known TBS is that kind of different. The professors aren't just academics who quote Greek and Hebrew, but shepherds who live the Word. They challenge me to dig deeper into Scripture, and into my soul.

My coursework has often corresponded with my life and ministry. While studying the Gospels, I was preaching through Mark. While learning Church History, I was watching history unfold in our church plant. When studying Apologetics, I found myself better equipped to engage skeptics in our community. I believe these alignments are not accidental, but divine.

TBS has given me more than knowledge. I have TBS brothers and sisters, classmates who pray for me, professors who mentor me, and staff who encourage me when I feel like quitting. In a world where ministry can feel isolating, TBS reminds me that I'm not alone.

That's why I consider TBS a sending place—not just a place to be filled up, but a place from which to be sent out. Because of what I'm learning at TBS, we've expanded our church's reach, we're discipling leaders with biblical foundations, launching outreach efforts with theological clarity, and working to create systems for sustainability rooted in kingdom principles—not personal preferences. TBS has impacted how we teach new believers at Cultivate, it echoes in our financial stewardship, shapes our mission to plant more churches and raise up more pastors. Like a ship traversing raging seas, howling winds, crashing waves, and fierce storms, I have weathered nights darker than ink. Yet, dawn always comes, and with it, hope.

In 2015, while immersed in divinity studies and final exam preparation, fever struck me like lightning strikes a mast. My flesh burned, my strength waned, and every exam was a mountain I had to climb with broken feet. Friends became angels and held my head under a cold tap to cool the relentless fire. I managed to complete my exams, but in July, I was rushed to

hospital where I fell unconscious and wavered between life and death. My lips turned purple, my nails blue, and doctors prepared my family for the likelihood I would die. But God wasn't done yet.

Though I couldn't open my eyes, I could hear. I heard prayers and songs of worship. I heard a whisper, "Someone fed you slow poison." My heartbeat slowed, fear gripped me, and death hovered close. I called out softly as hot tears rolled onto my pillow, "God, help me." That night I had a vision. I saw the cross, I saw blood—Christ's blood flowing over me, redeeming me. As

morning dawned, my fever disappeared to the amazement of my doctors. God spoke where medicine failed.

Two days later, I walked out. Alive. Complete. Redeemed.

Back home, as my body, soul and spirit continued healing, I began to wake up at 4 AM. I hungered to hear God. I opened the Bible and wrote one morning: "When a human soul is shattered in silence, it is then the Spirit of God begins to weave beauty from the darkness." The sentence turned into a stream of words, windows really, windows to pain, hope, and healing.

"SOMETIMES, A BEAUTIFUL SMILE CARRIES A THOUSAND SCARS."

I began to share my words, and they touched lives. A young woman wrote, "I was about to end it all. But your words told me to hang in there." I saw God again.

A publishing company, The Emotional Typewriter, reached out to me. They saw healing in my words, not for sales, but for souls. I saw the fingerprints of God even as He opened another door into prison ministry, which I entered with a guitar on my back and the Word of God in my heart. Prisoners wept. They opened up. God's presence hovered in every beat and Scripture.

My writing and ministry continued to deepen when I joined The Bible Seminary (TBS). Under the guidance of Dr. Stripling, I began taking classes that shaped my soul and sharpened my understanding.

The "BSM 501: Bible Study Methods" course proved invaluable for my work in prison ministry in New Delhi. Learning the interpretive journey—from observation to interpretation to application—has enabled me to study and teach the Scripture with greater clarity and depth. As I studied books like Esther, Obadiah and Mark, I learned to trace biblical patterns, recognise theological themes and connect Old and New Testament truths. The course changed the way I interact with inmates and has helped me explain God's Word in ways both accurate and that seem to have great meaning for their lives. I am gaining more confidence in helping people apply Scripture to real issues.

God has also entrusted me with teaching computer skills to visually impaired students. I've learned Braille to truly try and better understand their world. When I look into the eyes of people who cannot see, I realize mine is a ministry of presence, patience and love that has opened a wonderful door to share the gospel. With 2 Corinthians 5:7 as our anthem, "We live by faith and not by sight," faith became a shared vision that looks beyond limitations and into the heart of God's purpose.

The "PAS 511: Pastor-Leader I" course gave me a biblical blueprint for spiritual leadership, especially through the book, *Boss Like God*. Through Old Testament stories, I learned how God leads with a balance of justice, compassion and strategic timing—guiding, mentoring, disciplining, and leading people with divine precision. These insights have reshaped my approach to leadership. Whether I am leading teams of 100+ people in

non-profit organizations or helping coordinate the work of CBN India, I have begun to lead with efficiency and with spiritual intentionality. I am increasingly better understanding how to empower people, resolve conflicts, and fulfil responsibilities in ways that reflect God's character. The course has helped me anchor my leadership skills in Scripture.

The "THE 520: Biblical Archaeology" course has opened my eyes to a whole new understanding of archaeology in relation to Scripture. For example, discoveries such as the Amarna Letters and Merneptah Stele help clarify the historical context of Judges. Remains at sites like Hazor and Shiloh help me better understand and picture the biblical narratives, which has increased my confidence in the historical accuracy of Scripture and deepened my Christian faith.

Studying biblical languages of Hebrew and Greek has not only enriched my personal studies, but also enabled me to teach both languages. I currently teach Hebrew and Greek and culture to construction workers preparing for employment in Israel and Greece.

I continue to awake before dawn. Not because I am chasing the light, but because light lives in me. The words I write, the songs I play, every hand I hold in prison or guide in the classroom is part of the tapestry that God began to weave in me in the silence after the storm. ☀

Given the Torah's centrality to the daily life and religious identity of Jews in the Second Temple period, an extensive and highly structured educational system emerged around its instruction.



Torah study was a remarkable feature in Jewish life at the time of the Second Temple and during the period following it. It was not restricted to the formal setting of schools and synagogues, not to sages only, but became an integral part of ordinary Jewish life. The Torah was studied at all possible times, even if only a little at a time ... The sound of Torah learning issuing from houses at night was a common phenomenon. When people assembled for a joyous occasion such as circumcision or a wedding, a group might withdraw to engage in study of the Law.¹

Although no single, comprehensive account presents the precise details of education in Jesus' time, a synthesis of historical, Late rabbinic, and Late Second Temple literature offers a composite portrait. In essence, educational institutions were typically affiliated with the local synagogue and served as communal centers for both worship and instruction. Villages appear to have employed a teacher, respectfully referred to as a rabbi, to oversee the education of children, particularly in matters of Torah and religious practice, according to the following stages.



BEIT SEFER

AGES 5 - 10

According to the Mishnah—an authoritative compilation of rabbinic oral traditions and legal exegesis that constitutes the first portion of the Talmud—Jewish children commenced formal studies of Scripture around the age of five by attending a local Beit Sefer ("House of the Book"). Memorization played a central role, often beginning with Leviticus and an emphasis on the development of literacy skills, particularly reading and writing sacred texts. Scholarly consensus suggests that both boys and girls may have participated.

BET TALMUD

AGES 10 - 13

Students then engaged studying the Tanakh—an acronym that refers to the Hebrew Bible (Old Testament)—divided as follows:

- 1 **Torah ("Law"):** Five books of Moses—Genesis through Deuteronomy—serving as the foundational legal and narrative corpus.

Understanding Jesus' words **THROUGH THE PERSPECTIVE** of 1st century discipleship

- 2 **Nevi'im ("Prophets"):** Former Prophets (Joshua, Judges, Samuel, and Kings) and Latter Prophets (Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and the Twelve Minor Prophets, the latter treated as a single unified work).
- 3 **Ketuvim ("Writings"):** The remaining eleven books, including poetic, wisdom, and historical literature—with Ezra and Nehemiah included as a combined text.

Students also studied rabbinic discourses within the Mishnah, including interpretive frameworks (*midrashim*) and exegetical debates, to help cultivate textual mastery and practice interactive discourse.

At age thirteen, most students, especially girls, discontinued formal education and returned to assist with familial responsibilities. Many students would have internalized significant portions of the Torah by this point, including some who would have memorized it in its entirety.

Boys typically began apprenticeships within the family trade and also undertook their first pilgrimage to the Temple in Jerusalem to participate in the familial Passover sacrifice. This custom seems indicated in the biblical account of twelve-year-old Jesus in the Temple during Passover (Luke 2:41–42). This significant rite of passage evolved into the modern bar mitzvah observed in Orthodox Jewish practice.

BETH MIDRASH

AGES 13 - 16

More promising male students advanced to further study in the Beth Midrash. Under the guidance of their local rabbi, students engaged with the Talmud—a compendium of rabbinic discourse that includes commentary on the Mishnah and a repository of legal reasoning, theological reflection, and exegetical debate. Therein, students learned the hermeneutical traditions of rabbinic Judaism and gained training in interpretations of the Torah and Mishnah.

By age fifteen, students were studying methodological foundations of independent interpretation and learning proper techniques for formulating exegetical judgments and practical applications. Catechetical instruction in Christian traditions that emphasize doctrinal formation, scriptural engagement, and communal identity parallel these Jewish practices.

Memorization played a key role, since copies of written texts were limited and personal copies of the Scriptures were rare. Smaller communities may have only possessed a single scroll in their local synagogue. Reinforcement occurred via rhythmic, communal recitation, a technique that continues in many Middle Eastern Jewish and Muslim communities.

TALMID

While the majority of Beth Midrash students eventually served as scribes or teachers of the law, only a distinguished few were invited to study under direct mentorship of a renowned rabbi. These *talmid* (plur. *talmidim*), Hebrew for “disciple” or “follower,” were not merely learners, but persons who sought to emulate their rabbi’s teachings, lifestyle, and interpretive authority in both word and deed.

A *talmid* was far more than a conventional student. Whereas students typically seek knowledge for academic or vocational purposes, a *talmid* pursued transformation of character and identity, aspiring to become like their rabbi in every respect. An intensely personal and immersive relationship, *talmids* often left home and livelihood to follow their rabbi wholeheartedly. Then, the *talmidim* would attentively listen, watch, and imitate, internalizing both their rabbi’s teachings and manner of life. In time, these disciples themselves became rabbis to raise up a new generation of *talmidim*. This required rabbis to exercise great discernment in selecting disciples, typically accepting only the most intellectually gifted and spiritually disciplined candidates. Prospective students often faced rigorous evaluation with very few deemed worthy of a rabbi’s invitation to “Come, follow me.”

Christ’s Call to COME, FOLLOW ME

Now, consider the full weight and radical nature of Jesus’ invitation to fishermen, tradesmen, tax collectors and other ordinary people—routinely marginalized individuals based on traditional rabbinic systems. His call to discipleship conferred upon people a dignity and vocational calling far beyond normal and much more in the realm of incredulity.

Yet, Jesus did not reject the rabbinic model so much as reorient and deepen it. He invited His followers to both KNOWLEDGE and TRANSFORMATION—learn the texts, history, and proper traditions AND become like Him in character, mission, and relationship with God. He reconceptualized discipleship as not merely the intellectual mastery of sacred texts and religious traditions, but as the embodiment of Him—the incarnate Word of God. It is precisely this sort of discipleship that furthers the replication of true Jesus followers, and also highlights the radical call offered by the Rabbi from Nazareth.

MULTIPLICATION IN ACTION

By catering to Distance Education students, The Bible Seminary (TBS) has an impact far beyond the Houston, Texas region. For example, I live and work as Chief Assistant County Attorney in Pikeville, Kentucky in the heart of the Appalachian Mountains and am pursuing a Master of Arts in Biblical History and Archaeology (MABHA).

Based on my experiences as a TBS student and as a Tel Shiloh excavation Square Supervisor, I recently founded a new non-profit, Expedition Archaeology (EA). I have been providing educational opportunities related to biblical archaeology to area churches and schools for several years. The organization is designed to help give these projects a dedicated home with hopes of continuing to grow something regionally unique and special.

Expedition Archaeology presentations focus on archaeological discoveries from the biblical world and how those illuminate the context of the biblical text. However, what makes EA unique is the artifact displays that accompany presentations. Participants usually enjoy a museum style display of 40 to 50 artifacts from the Holy Land. Spanning the Bronze Age through the Roman era, the displays include artifacts from the time of Abraham to the time of Jesus. The "touch table" is always popular since people can hold and examine various artifacts.

I learned a long time ago that the artifacts are the star of the show. The opportunity to interact with objects included in biblical narratives helps illuminate the Bible. In the heart of

Appalachia, people would have to drive several hours to see any materials from the ancient world, so we bring artifacts to them.

Combining artifacts with educational opportunities has been very successful with audiences. The creation of EA opens the door for other young scholars to offer similar presentations. The EA Board hopes to create a second collection available to loan to young scholars so they can offer EA presentation in areas where they live and work.

TBS student, Niki Lainhart, also hails from Kentucky and has contributed to several EA projects. I hope Niki may be the first young scholar to employ the second traveling artifact display to bring the world of the Bible to life for churches in her area.

GENESIS 12:4



Moses's journey included struggling with his own sense of inadequacy, reconnecting with his people to earn their trust and respect, confronting a pharaoh, leading a mixed multitude into an expectant wilderness journey, navigating myriad personnel and morale issues, building leaders, shaping a fledgling group of oppressed tribes into a nation, and casting a compelling vision far beyond his own lifetime and opportunity to experience the full blessings himself. BEZALEL

Bezalel and Oholiab's journey included leading the personnel and processes to create divinely inspired and spiritually nourishing artistic works made of bronze, gold, silver, jewel stones, fabric, and wood. The journeys of Jesus's first followers included face-to-face discipleship with the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, confronting their own prejudices and sins, enduring persecutions, witnessing (and effecting) incredible miracles, observing the suffering and death of their expected Messiah, and experiencing their resurrected Lord firsthand. THE SON OF GOD

Craig A. Evans, Ph.D., D.Habil. • Richmond, Texas

In 9 BC the Roman Empire celebrated the birthday of Emperor Augustus. Several inscriptions were set up around the empire. The best preserved of these inscriptions was found at Priene, central Turkey. Scholars have pieced together the fragments, with the result that we have most of the original Greek text. And what a text it is! In it we are told that with the birth of Caesar Augustus (called “god,” “son of a god,” and “savior”) the “good news for the world began.” His divinity was made “manifest,” so we are told. Indeed, his accomplishments—e.g., ending war, securing peace and safety, even influencing the weather and gaining the favor of the gods—have been so amazing there is no chance, say the authors of this remarkable inscription, that any successor will ever surpass him.¹

Readers of the New Testament will immediately think of Jesus, when they hear terms like “son of god,” “good news,” “began”/“beginning,” “manifest,” and “savior.” Everywhere in the New Testament Jesus is confessed as “Son of God” (e.g., John 11:27; Acts 9:20; Rom 1:4; 2 Cor 1:19) and “Savior” (e.g., John 4:42; Acts 5:31; 13:23; Phil 3:20). Jesus’ glory is “made manifest” in his ministry (e.g., John 2:11; 1 Tim 3:16; 2 Tim 1:10) and in his resurrection (e.g., Acts 10:40). And, of course, the very message of the Christian Church is summed up in the word “gospel,” or “good news” (e.g., Matt 9:35; Acts 8:25; 14:7; 15:7; Rom 1:3, 15–16). All of these assertions push back against the Roman cult of the divine emperor, thanks to whom the “good news” for the world supposedly has begun.

No one pushed back against the pagan cult more directly than did the Evangelist Mark, who in the opening verse of his Gospel boldly declares: “The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, Son of God” (Mark 1:1). Every word in this verse challenges the cult of the divine emperor: the “good news” doesn’t “begin” with Caesar; it begins with Jesus. Caesar isn’t the “Son of God,” nor is he “Savior”; Jesus is. No one reading or hearing these words read could miss the point that the Evangelist Mark is making.

In many places in the Gospel of Mark, Jesus does what Caesar only could dream of: He heals the sick, he raises the dead, he calms the storm, he walks on water, he feeds multitudes, and he forgives sinners. On top of all of that, Jesus conquered death. ***In the life, death, and ministry of Jesus, the concept of “Son of God” was dramatically redefined.***

The Roman world was stunned by the grace and power of the new good news. In less than three centuries after the death and resurrection of Jesus, the true Son of God, the Christian Church swept the Roman Empire. Not long after, the city of Rome went from being the seat of opposition to the Church to being its headquarters.

I invite you to sign up for my course this fall, “GRK 503: Greek Exegesis.” In this class, we will study in great detail many passages from the Gospel of Mark that contrast Jesus with the Roman emperors. You will gain a much deeper appreciation of what the early Church faced, as well as what the Church today faces in our increasingly paganizing culture. 



from pencils to purpose

Some of my earliest memories are of participating in church, not just attending. My parents started taking me at age two, and I was hooked from the very beginning. I liked the sermons and snacks, but I loved the rhythm. I'd sit in the pews tapping out beats with pencils, lost in the sound of worship music and probably driving people crazy. My dad, a man known for finding simple solutions, crafted a wooden dowel with a rubber tip to quieten my drumming. His thoughtful fix didn't just solve a distraction, it lit a spark and kindled a fire within.

By age eight I moved from drumming in the pews to playing on the platform with the worship band. Music became more than a hobby—worship became a means of expression and a first stepping stone toward a life of ministry. Looking back, I can see how God was writing a story and leading me on an adventure that includes more than 25 years of service in and around ministry.

I sometimes jokingly call myself a "church rat." My movement from pencils to

platform eventually led to leadership roles: Worship Leader, Youth and Children's Pastor, Administrative Pastor—even Janitor, which might just be my favorite. Maybe I'll end up working as full-time Janitor some day. A guy can dream, right?

Ministry has shaped who I am, and not just part of my identity or something I did, but something I was made to do. By 2019, I began to feel an interesting stirring in my heart. My wife, Krystle, and I spent nearly two years in prayer, ready for whatever God had next, but waiting for clarity on a path forward. We waited, trusting, praying, and wondering.

Then, one ordinary afternoon, something extraordinary happened. I received an email from The Bible Seminary. I knew the Provost, Dr. Scott Stripling, and opened the newsletter mostly out of curiosity. At the bottom, I saw this small announcement, "The Bible Seminary is seeking a Communications Director."

My heart skipped a beat.

I responded without hesitation.

The job interested me.

Deeply.

Passionately.

It felt like the clarity we were seeking. Shortly after, I met with Dr. K. Lynn Lewis. I remember our first conversations vividly, especially his honest, simple words, "If this works out, your job will be to tell the story of TBS."

That was it. No over-complicated mission statement or pressure to become something I wasn't. Just a clear invitation to serve as a storyteller for a people and a purpose I already respected. I could do that. I wanted to do that. But it wasn't just the role that appealed—it was the values. Dr. Lewis pointedly emphasized God and family. He told me that my relationship with God came first, then my wife and kids, and then ministry work, in that order no matter what. He had no idea, but those words were a direct answer to years of prayer after

years of running at a pace that left little room for my high calling as a husband and father.

The rest, as they say, is history. Since that meeting six years ago, my life looks completely different. TBS isn't just a workplace—it's an extension of my family. It's where I'm encouraged to lead well, serve faithfully, and be husband and father, present at home and engaged with my family. My job allows me to do meaningful work and play Nintendo with my kids, have real conversations with my wife, and simply be home. I've learned the value of working hard and resting well, both for the glory of God and something I think many in ministry often forget, or perhaps never learn to do.

But my time at TBS has brought more than professional growth and personal rest. It has also been deeply spiritual. Since my job has included recording, editing, and producing classes, I've had the opportunity to sit in on nearly every class the seminary offers. I've listened to brilliant professors teach the Word of God with depth and clarity—and I've been changed by it. I've experienced healing

through their instruction, and seen truth pierce through layers of stress, uncertainty, and spiritual fatigue.

That which first moved my heart six years ago continues to shape my thinking. Anchors of faith help me see God's design for life with greater clarity. I've learned that biblical truth isn't something reserved for the pulpit, it is for everyone and it is life changing.

I believe seminary—at least the experiences TBS offers—isn't just for pastors and ministry leaders, but for anyone who wants to move beyond surface-level faith and actually dig into Scripture. Rather than cheerily accept whatever one hears on Sunday at face value, believers need to be students of the Word. We need to ask questions, search for answers, and allow the Bible to shape our worldview, decisions, and daily lives.

And that's exactly what TBS offers—transformation, equipping for service, leadership, parenting, worshiping, living, and working with purpose. Whether your call is preaching, teaching, administration, or other work—even cleaning and sweeping, TBS is a place for you. I'm proof of that.

Today, I'm filled with gratitude—for the unexpected email that changed the course of my life, for leadership that values people over performance, for friends and colleagues who feel like family, and for chances to use my gifts to tell stories worth telling. Most of all, I am grateful for the grace of God that threads through every part of my journey—from pencils in a pew to a calling with purpose.

If you wonder if seminary is for you, it might be. Don't count yourself out or write seminary off because you're not a preacher with a pulpit. TBS is mostly about learning to live out your faith whether you serve in a church, a business, at home, or with a camera telling stories.

TBS changed my life. Not just my career, but my life. It gave me back family time, reignited my passion for God's Word, reminded me of who I am and why I do what I do, and gave me the gift of telling stories—real stories—about how God continues to work through ordinary people with willing hearts. If that stirs something in you, too, maybe your journey starts here. ☩

I taught my first TBS course in Church History in 2013 (at left), and I am now in my ninth year as Provost. Over these past twelve years TBS has developed into a leading institution for theological, linguistic, and archaeological training. From my perspective, this past year was the best one yet. I am rejoicing in the position in which we now find ourselves.

Below are some of the highlights.



Debt-Free Commitment

While many Christian universities and seminaries are closing their doors or drowning in debt, TBS remains a debt-free institution. Nyack College and Trinity International University, both bastions of evangelicalism for over 125 years, are the latest to collapse under the weight of debt. Houston Christian University is carrying a staggering \$107 million in debt. Being debt-free positions TBS favorably for training the next generation of servant-leaders to fulfill the Great Commission. In addition to our institutional debt-free status, 100% of our graduates have also graduated with no seminary debt. This allows them to pursue their life's calling without the crushing burden of debt. This is truly remarkable. Proverbs 22:7 remains true: "The rich rule over the poor, and the borrower is servant to the lender."

Renewed Accreditation

After completing a comprehensive self-study and an external site visit from a Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools (TRACS) accreditation team, we achieved a ten-year reaffirmation of our accreditation good through 2035. Dr. Lewis and I, along with our Board Chair, Adam Peters, met virtually with the TRACS commission in late April. The final meeting culminating a more than two-year journey only lasted about ten minutes, during which time our reviewers praised our accomplishments, gave us the good news, and prayed for TBS. As a result, our credits will continue to be fully transferable to other accredited schools and our graduates will continue to matriculate into doctoral programs and vibrant ministries around the world. TRACS is one of only ten national accrediting agencies recognized by the United States Department of Education.



World-Class Faculty

Last semester we added one of the world's leading New Testament scholars, Professor Craig A. Evans, to our full-time faculty as Distinguished Research Professor. In addition to his New Testament expertise, Dr. Evans is a leading expert in the Dead Sea Scrolls and the literature of the late Second Temple period. He is author of more than 90 books and countless peer-reviewed articles and chapters in addition to serving as editor of many important series. Over the past decade, Dr. Evans and I have co-authored several articles and appeared together in various documentaries relating to the reliability of the biblical text. Dr. Evans is currently finishing an expanded revision of his two-volume commentary on the Gospel of Mark for the prestigious Word Biblical Commentary. This 800-page exegetical commentary is scheduled for publication in 2026. This fall, Dr. Evans is scheduled to teach advanced biblical Greek (GRK 503) with a focus on the Gospel of Mark. (see "Son of God" on p. 37 and "Welcome New Professor" on p. 63)

Shiloh Excavation and Mediterranean Cruise

We recently completed our seventh season of excavation at biblical Shiloh. Twenty TBS students, alumni, and faculty members joined me for this year's dig. We continued excavating a monumental building (likely the biblical Tabernacle), the remains of the sacrificial system, and the gate complex from the Bronze and Iron Ages. Students and faculty members from a dozen other universities participated in our consortium under the umbrella of the Associates for Biblical Research. TBS students in the Master of Arts in Biblical History and Archaeology program earned credit for their field practicum and ceramic analysis. Others earned elective credit. I estimate that we will need three more excavation seasons to complete this important project.

Travel adventures help facilitate spiritual development, mentorship, and lifelong friendships. *Mike McGown, Senior Pastor at Parkway Fellowship and a TBS Board member, and I are leading a "Footsteps of Paul" Mediterranean cruise this November. Stay tuned for exciting reports about this trip which includes travelers from both Parkway Fellowship and TBS this November, prefaced by a "Footsteps of Paul" seminar at Parkway Fellowship on Thursday, August 14 (see page 17).*

WHY ‘BIBLE’ IS OUR MIDDLE NAME

When I meet people and tell them I’m a professor, they often ask where I teach. When I say, “The Bible Seminary,” a common response is, “Which one?”

It’s a fair question.

Hundreds, perhaps thousands, of Bible colleges and seminaries across the United States are named after a founder, donor, or historic Christian personage. Some draw their names directly from core biblical terms such as Christ, grace, or covenant. Many schools combine one of these terms with the city or state where they are based.

Why “The Bible Seminary” Matters



As The Bible Seminary (TBS) celebrates 15 years, we rejoice in the fruit of seeds first planted by Pastor Jim Leggett of Grace Fellowship Church. He dreamed of training ministers in, through, and with all 66 books of the Bible based on a conviction that Scripture is the foundational training text and basis for any curriculum designed to prepare women and men for gospel ministry in the Church and the world.

That conviction remains central to the identity, mission, and culture of TBS. It’s why one of our foundational commitments is to provide, “Comprehensive, strategic training in all 66 books of the Bible integrated into instruction in the standard historical, theological, and practical disciplines critical to developing professional skills for 21st century ministry.”

In practice, this means TBS courses combine the standard topics of ministerial training

(Bible study, theology, preaching, counseling, evangelism, etc.) with studies of Bible books. When students study church administration in “PAS 512: Pastor-Leader II,” they also study Joshua, Ezra, and Nehemiah to discover how those gifted leader-administrators served God’s people. When students learn to practice individual and corporate devotional habits in “PRA 501: Prayer and Worship,” they also study Leviticus, 1-2 Chronicles, and Psalms to explore how God’s people worshipped and prayed in Scripture.

Every TBS course represents intentional, intricate blending of Bible with practical knowledge and skills. The Bible sets the agenda for how we approach each topic and engage in each practice. It’s how we fulfill our mission “to foster biblical literacy through studies of all 66 books of the Bible, cultivate professional and lay leadership skills, and deploy trained Christian disciples in service worldwide.”

“Because the Bible is the fully true Word of God (2 Timothy 3:16), we will offer and require the study of all 66 books of the Bible before graduation with a degree. We will seek to creatively integrate classical theological disciplines and ministry training by studying books of the Bible (i.e. Church History will begin with the Book of Acts and keep going; Pastoral Leadership will come through the study of the Pastoral Epistles; Systematic Theology will flow out of the study of the Pauline Epistles).”

Central to our commitment to orienting our entire curriculum and culture around the words of Scripture is II Timothy 3:16–17 (NIV), “All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.”

Paul is stating that all Scripture is “God-breathed” or “inspired by God.” This identifies God as the source of the words of the entirety of Scripture, the divine author of the collection of 66 books we call The Holy Bible. God wrote through dozens of human authors over approximately 1,500 years in three languages (Hebrew, Aramaic, Greek), but He remains the singular voice behind Scripture.

God’s voice in Scripture makes it utterly unique from every other written text in human history. God’s authorship carries his divine authority. The Bible is human literature, but not merely human literature. Peters explains it this way in 2 Peter 1:20–21 (NIV), “Above all, you must understand that no prophecy of Scripture came about by the prophet’s own interpretation of things. For prophecy never had its origin in the human will, but prophets, though human, spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit.”

The words of Scripture are the Word of God. In 2 Timothy 3, Paul writes that Scripture is useful for four things: teaching, rebuking, correcting, and training in righteousness. I’ve often compared these to GPS directions. When you enter your desired destination into GPS it tells you where you are and how to get to where you’re going. Scripture provides this same orientation to reality, life, and our ultimate destination through its teaching.

Scripture also has the power to rebuke. Just as a GPS notifies us that we’ve gone the wrong way and recalculates our route to get back on track, Scripture tells us where we’ve gone wrong and directs us back to the right path. This is not simply a matter of teaching right from wrong. Rather, the same Holy Spirit that inspired Scripture speaks to us through the words of Scripture to bring conviction which leads to confession and the Spirit’s power to repent, leading us to follow Jesus—the Way.

Restored to the path, Scripture provides us with ongoing “training in righteousness” as one of God’s primary tools to make us mature, complete, and holy. Scripture—like a GPS—can help guide us to our final destination. Inspired and illuminated by God, Scripture helps equip us for every good work (2 Timothy 3:17; Ephesians 2:8–10).

Given the authority and purpose of Scripture, we are committed to relying on Scripture as the primary source of our curriculum and training. Every other textbook, lecture, or teaching tool we use is, at best, a commentary on the words of Scripture to help us better understand, interpret, and apply them in every aspect of life and ministry. God has revealed himself to us in the words of Scripture and the Person of Jesus Christ. By the power of the Holy Spirit within us, we remain committed to teaching and training our students through Scripture and rejoice that Bible is our middle name. ☺

The Trinity in Eden by Jacob R. Figueroa

Historic Christianity insists that New Testament authors indubitably describe God as three distinct but unified personae: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Although absent from the Bible, the creedal term "Trinity" has become an essential doctrine, while also causing centuries of confusion and controversy among biblical scholars.

But, what about the Old Testament? *The Trinity in Eden* presents linguistic research on the oldest account in the Bible: the Primeval History from creation to the tower of Babel. The author concludes that the names of God, the plural pronouns of God, and the execration of the serpent together affirm that the concept of the Trinity is, at least, as old as the Bible itself.

Author Jacob R. Figueroa holds a Master of Arts in Linguistics (2017) from the University of North Texas and a Master of Arts in Biblical Languages and Culture (2023) from The Bible Seminary. His linguistic expertise is augmented by the studies of Arabic, Russian, German, as well as biblical Greek and Hebrew. 

WELCOME **NEW** DISTINGUISHED RESEARCH PROFESSOR

Dr. Craig Evans (see “The Son of God” on p. 37) joined the TBS staff full-time in January 2025. He will be officially installed as Distinguished Research Professor of The Bible Seminary during Commencement on Sunday, August 17 at The Waters Church in Katy, Texas.

A well-known evangelical scholar, Dr. Evans is an elected member of the prestigious Society of New Testament Studies (SNTS) and Director of the Christian Thinkers Society Fellows Program and Strategic Studies.

After teaching one year at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, Evans taught at Trinity Western University in British Columbia for twenty-one years, where he directed the graduate program in Biblical Studies and founded the Dead Sea Scrolls Institute. Evans then taught for thirteen years at the Divinity College at Acadia University in Nova Scotia. He was also a Visiting Fellow at Princeton Theological Seminary in Princeton, New Jersey. He then served as the John Bisagno Distinguished Professor of Christian Origins at Houston Christian University.

Author and editor of more than ninety books and hundreds of articles and reviews, Professor Evans has given lectures at Cambridge, Oxford, Durham, Yale, and other universities, colleges, seminaries, and museums, such as the Field Museum in Chicago, the Canadian Museum of Civilization in Ottawa, and the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto. He is a Fox News Opinion contributor and also regularly lectures and gives talks at popular conferences and retreats on the historical Jesus, Archaeology, the Dead Sea Scrolls, and the Bible.

Along with countless interviews on radio networks across Canada and the US, Evans has been seen on Dateline NBC, CBC, CTV, Day of Discovery, and many documentaries aired on BBC, The Discovery Channel, History Channel, History Television, and others. He has also served as a consultant for the National Geographic Society and for The Bible miniseries, produced by Mark Burnett and Roma Downey.



Yet, the college forester already knew the answer. Hidden away in the back hills of the college property was a great stand of giant oak trees, over 500 years old, all planted at the same time by the same man who fashioned the original beams back in 1386. He knew his handiwork would wear out someday, so he planned ahead by planting saplings to grow trees for replacement beams centuries before they were needed."

I am so grateful for all the people who helped launch TBS back in 2010 with a vision to raise up giant oak ministers to advance the Kingdom of God and help fulfill the Great Commission. Let's keep investing in those oak trees!






